please let us know. The process for accessing report cards remains the same as last term.

Based on parent feedback, we are making some changes to our Celebration of Learning this term. Grade 4-6 teachers will be running a more traditional style parent-teacher interview. For our Grade 1-3 families, we will continue with student-led Celebration of Learning however, we will change the schedule to have one family at a time in the classroom. We will be asking for feedback from our parent community afterward, so please let us know your thoughts on the changes.

It is important to our school that our parents are informed about student progress and development. Please join us in celebrating the excellent learning your child is doing at our school. 

Hello, March!

February flew by and it is hard to believe we are already in March! We had a great month filled with kindness and friendship. March will be just as busy and full of learning.

In Language, we will be continuing our work with letters and Phonemic Awareness. The children have become excellent at identifying the beginning sounds of words. We will keep practicing middle and ending sounds.

In Math, we are working on patterning. Recognizing and creating patterns helps students to develop problem solving and critical thinking skills. You can practice this work at home by pointing out patterns in your environment (i.e., tiles, fabrics, etc.), using toys to create a pattern, or by clapping rhythms.

In Science, we will explore how animals and objects move in their environment. We will use materials such as ramps and marble runs to play with this concept.

In Social Studies, we will continue to work on our identity project. We will sort wants vs. needs and begin to understand the balance between wants and needs. We will also finish our continent study on Asia and begin our continent study on Europe.

We look forward to seeing everyone at Celebration of Learning at the end of the month!

Upper Elementary, Gr. 4, 5, 6

Hello from Upper ELMO!

February was a short but fun-filled month for us in 4, 5, 6. The students have been so excited to get outside in the recent warmer weather—here is hoping that the groundhog was right and spring is on its way soon! A favourite of all students is our Community Kindness Week. Miss Desiree's class supported patients in the GPRH Cancer Unit with cards and art filled with words of encouragement. Miss Kristen's class boosted morale of students, staff and our neighbors with posters and compliments. Miss Jackie's class collected much needed items for Odyseev House. Miss Stefanie's class made posters for the Phoenix Youth Group and hung them up around the city to spread awareness. We are all so proud of our students and the leadership they displayed when making an impactful connection with our community!

In Language, students continue their work in various literacy groups, including instruction and practice with writing skills, phonics, fluency, and comprehension. Our school has shifted to using CORE Literacy assessments. These are based on foundational language skills and assesses students with several shorter tests to give a detailed picture of what specific needs each student has. These assessments have been well received by our students, and as an Upper ELMO team, we have been able to gain so much from the data collected. It guides our teaching time with students and lets us know what gaps or extensions each student needs to be successful.

In Math, students have finished up statistics and sequencing. They have moved onto algebra, order of operations and solving for unknown variables in various equations. It is really engaging for students as they can view algebra as a math mystery just waiting to be solved! Another Upper ELMO focus has been building fact fluency. Each class has been dedicating time to this in their own way and our goal is to increase speed and accuracy when performing multiplication and division facts up to and including 12x12.

The topic of Space is wrapping up nicely and we move onto other living systems soon! In Social Studies, we continue to expand our understanding of Democracy. It is a huge topic in the new curriculum and it is important for the students to make their own connections to it.

In Art, Grade 4s have been applying several elements of art into a beautiful succulent drawing. We will be moving on to more hands-on art projects in March. Grade 5s have been working on an Eric Carle painted collage project. Grade 6s have been painting pictures with plasticine and will be moving onto handcrafts in March. In Music, all students have been learning a variety of ukulele chords and following along to a mix of traditional and popular songs. Soon they will be tasked with writing their own song!

Has your child had their annual eye exam? It's important to do before they start school!

Eye See...Eye Learn™

is a program that provides kindergarten-aged students with a comprehensive eye exam from an optometrist. There is Alberta Health coverage towards your child's eye exams up to age 19. **If required**, **kindergarten-aged students also receive a free pair of eyeglasses**.

How kindergarten-aged students participate

Step 1 Parents can find a participating optometrist at optometrists.ab.ca. Click on Find an Optometrist and **Eye See...Eye Learn**[™], then enter your postal code to find a doctor close to you. **Call and book an appointment.**

Step 2 See your optometrist for the eye exam. Have your health card ready. There is Alberta Health coverage towards your child's eye exams up to age 19.

Step 3 If required, kindergarten-aged students will receive a free pair of eyeglasses. Ask to see the frame selection available. The optometrist will order your glasses for you.

*Free glasses are covered by a one year manufacturer's warranty.

Who can participate?

Eye See...Eye Learn[™] is available to all kindergarten-aged students in Alberta. It's important to address eye health and vision problems before children begin school.

Eye See,

Children are eligible from August until they begin grade one.

Eye exam coverage

There is Alberta Health coverage towards your child's eye exams up to age 19. It's a painless, non-invasive process that could change their lives!

Did you know?

- 80% of learning is visual.
- 1 in 4 school-aged children has a vision problem.


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- An eye exam detects health problems such as crossed eyes or lazy eye.
- Children with vision problems are often misdiagnosed as having learning or behavioural disabilities.
- The earlier an eye health or visual problem is identified, the more likely it can be corrected.
- Children often don't know they have a vision problem, as they believe what they are seeing is normal.
- It is not uncommon for parents to believe they would know if their child has a vision problem, because these issues can be hard to spot particularly if there is a problem in only one of the eyes.

What is an optometrist?

Your optometrist (doctor of optometry) is a primary source for all your vision, eye health and eyewear needs. They have the knowledge, tools and equipment necessary to diagnose, treat, prescribe medications or refer to a specialist, if needed.

How well can your child see?



You can't see the world through your child's eyes, but your optometrist can. During your child's eye exam, your optometrist will assess:

- Visual acuity (how well they can see)
- Lazy eye, crossed eyes
- Nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism
- Colour vision
- Eye coordination, tracking and depth perception
- Eye health
